

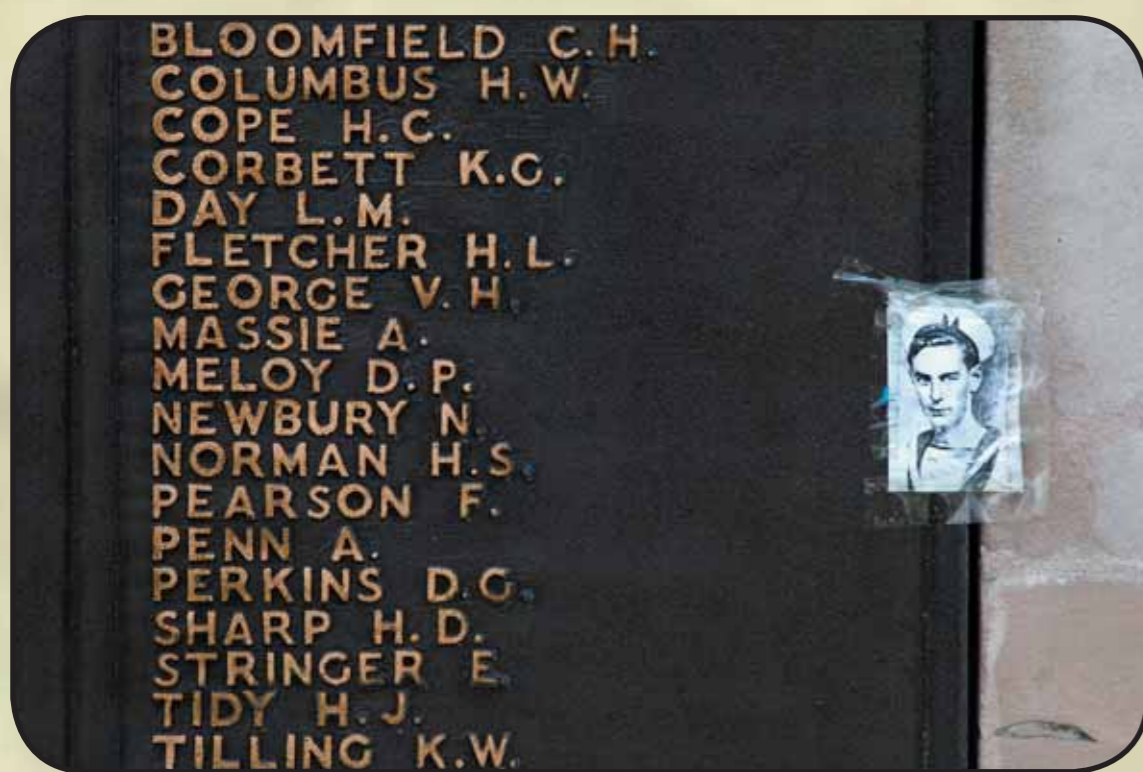
KNOWN UNTO GOD
